Matt Young to Speak at UUCP on "How Morality Evolved"

Saturday, June 2, 3:00 pm

Matt Young is Teaching Professor of Physics at the Colorado School of Mines and a retired Physicist with the National Institute of Standards and Technology, where he earned the Department of Commerce Gold Medal for his work in optical fiber communications. He has published books on optical physics, technical writing, science and religion, and topics related to evolution.

In 1999, he carried out a comprehensive study of science and religion, and eventually joined the "debate" (scare quotes intended) between evolution and its deniers. He is a founding member of the influential evolution blog, *The Panda's Thumb*, and serves as its de-facto photography editor.

Matt is also President of the Board of Colorado Citizens for Science, a nonprofit organization formed in 2002. It is composed of scientists and interested laypersons, and is loosely modeled after groups in other states that have been formed to support quality science education standards. CCFS acts to oppose the teaching of pseudosciences that pose as science but fail to meet the widely accepted standards of the field.

All are invited to hear Matt speak on this fascinating subject, and to participate in a lively discussion afterward. Admission is free (but donations are gladly accepted). Several of Matt's books, including *Why Evolution Works (and Intelligent Design Fails)*, will be available for sale.

Congregational Meeting, Sunday, June 24

Members will meet after the Sunday program, June 24 to vote on several items. There are three seats on the Board to be filled: president, treasurer, and an at-large seat. Dan Stone, Nominating Committee chair, requests that your suggestions be relayed to him.

There are also two proposals to be voted on: a name change for the church as well as a mission statement. Only those who were members as of May 24, 2012 are eligible to vote. Read on for details about the proposals.

Mission Statement Proposal

The Board is proposing a new mission statement to be submitted to the congregation for approval at the upcoming congregational meeting June 24. Here are the current and proposed mission statements for you to ponder:

Current: We are a Welcoming Congregation supporting a free, open search for spiritual truth and meaning and promoting the ideals of peace and justice.

Proposed: We are a diverse, Welcoming community that celebrates spiritual and religious freedom; nurtures growth and

learning; and works toward a more compassionate, tolerant and sustainable world.

Name Change

We will also vote on a possible name change for our organization. (The current name is Unitarian Universalist Church of Pueblo.) Don Bruestle, co-chair of the Vision & Growth Committee, facilitated discussions about the topic at four Sunday meetings during April.

For those who attended, there was a consensus to drop the word Universalist and to find a different descriptor other than the word church. (We will, of course, remain an affiliate of the Unitarian Universalist Association.)

There were several suggestions, one of which was to resume our previous name Unitarian Fellowship; others include First Unitarian Society, Congregation or Community. Some ideas included a nod to our location: Pueblo, Southern Colorado, Arkansas Valley. Suffice it to say there was a variety of appellations offered. A vote will be taken at the congregational meeting on June 24.
